a. Annual Return. The SCC Annual Return for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> March 2023, the accounting statements and annual governance statement were presented and approved by Solva Community Council, certified by the RFO, and signed by the chair on 6<sup>th</sup> June 2023. The Annual Return and all supporting documents were submitted to Audit Wales on 7<sup>th</sup> June 2023.

### 7. Relationship with Pembrokeshire County Council (PCC)

a. There are no formal charters or protocols to help SCC work with PCC. However, the elected County Councillor for Solva attends every SCC meeting and takes a proactive approach to PCC related matters.

**Objective 5**: To actively support and promote the Welsh Language, Welsh Heritage, and its traditions.

**Objective 6**: To achieve the General Power of Competence and meet all statutory responsibilities set out in The Local Government and Elections (Wales) Act 2021.

**Objective 7**: To accomplish more homes with greater housing choice that will foster better employment opportunities.

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#### 10. Assets and services.

- a. SCC has the following fixed assets:
  - i. Lower play park.
  - ii. Upper play and skate park.
  - iii. Community Clubhouse, car park and sports pitch.
  - iv. Parc y Capel.

### 11. Managed Services.

- a. Grounds Maintenance (GM). SCC has a GM contract for the following community areas in Solva and Whitchurch.
  - i. Parc Y Capel.
  - ii. Whitchurch church old cemetery.
  - iii. Lower play park.
  - iv. Upper play park.
  - v. Fort Road.
  - vi. Bus shelters (cleaning).
- b. Newsletter. SCC has a contract with a freelance editor to produce the Newsletter.
- c. Internal Auditor. LM Griffiths & Co Charted Certified Accountants were appointed by SCC to deliver annual internal auditor services.
- d. External Auditor. Audit Wales is the external auditor for SCC.



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- e. Payroll. LM Griffiths & Co Charted Certified Accountants were appointed by SCC to deliver payroll services.
- 12. Asset transfers in progress or completed.
  - a. Coast Allotment Project. SCC continues to work with PCC to achieve a Community Asset Transfer (CAT) which will better enable community ownership and management over a sustained period of time. The Allotment Project is in Bro Dawel and the site is less than half an acre.
  - b. Lower Solva public toilets. If, before 5 November 2023<sup>3</sup>, PCC receive an expression of interest to either fully fund the provision going forward, or a commitment that a community asset transfer will be in place by 31 March 2024, the facility will remain open until this date to allow for arrangements to be made. SCC's agreed way forward is a CAT<sup>4</sup>.
- 13. Activities to be undertaken with planned community engagement.
  - a. To support the key objectives SCC will conduct separate consultations as needed. For each consultation SCC will:
    - i. Communicate clear and unambiguous objectives.
    - ii. Implement effective publicity to ensure all residents and groups have the information needed to enable participation.
    - iii. Publicise the outcomes of the community consultations.
